### b) NSW Ambulance Service (Jason Moffitt)

### c) NSW Fire and Rescue (Peter Treseder, Stephen Knight):

- Introducing new breathing apparatus a great step.
- Team members went down to assist Country Fire Authority Tasmania.
- 4 Truck rollovers in the zone.
- Attended house fires due to air conditioners.
- The Regional West Area Commander has been transferred, with the vacant position based in Dubbo to be filled shortly.
- 3 applicants interviewed for 2 positions in Narromine.
- Both Bob Davis and Donny Cross are retiring. This is a big loss with many years' experience. A farewell dinner will be held on 23 March.
- PPE has been tested with new gear to be rolled out.

### d) Narromine Volunteer Rescue Association (Jacob Mill)

- Jacob reported 2 members attended callouts for storm damage.
- With the announcement of \$18.8 million funding from the NSW government over the next 4 years, new uniforms and vehicles will be seen in the future.

### e) NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) (Lyndon Wieland)

- Lyndon reported 8 units from the area are attending the Northern region assisting with fires. They will be replaced in 5 days.
- The Cat 6 tanker for Trangie should arrive anytime now.
- Aircraft are flying out of Dubbo for the Northern fires.
- With more hot weather and storms on the way, we cannot be complacent. Lightning strikes in timbered areas are a real threat.

### f) NSW Police Orana – Narromine (Sergeant Mick Smith)

- Mick reported they have access to the CCTV system, and it is great quality.
   They are very happy with it. There are also portable cameras.
- Traffic operation of the Christmas break was good with not many instances.
   2 drink driving and an unlicensed disqualified driver.
- Rural crime is an issue. More diesel thefts over the Christmas period. Working closely with the Rural Crime Squad.
- A recent breakthrough with the arrest of 2 men and a significant amount of stolen property recovered.
- A new recruit is commencing their 3 year tenure in early March.


# Tomingley Gold Operations Quarterly Update



### Underground Operations Have Commenced!

Towards the end of last year, Alkane decided to proceed with underground mining beneath the Wyoming One open cut. We purchased second-hand underground mining equipment and refurbished it to suit the operation's needs. Then, on 2 January this year, a specialist underground mining workforce came onboard at TGO.

The first blast took place on 7 January, leading to the development of two portals off the northern ramp in the Wyoming One open cut. From there, two declines (5m wide, 5.5m high, gradient of 1:7) will spiral down below the surface to provide access for the mining equipment. At publication, the underground development has progressed over 100m.

# Farewell to Open Cut Mining Meanwhile, open cut mining is in its final stages. The Wyoming Three pit has been partially backfilled and a goodbye cut added in the Wyoming One and Caloma Two pits.

We have almost completed final shaping of the residual landforms – the two large waste rock emplacements (WREs) have been shaped and topsoiled. Final shaping of these WREs will be completed by mid-year followed by hydroseeding of the batters to progress rehabilitation. (Underground operations will not markedly change the final landforms.)


### **Exploration Nearby**

Alkane's exploration team has been busy exploring gold prospects in the region between Tomingley village and Peak Hill (Roswell, El Paso and San Antonio Prospects). This program aims to find economically viable targets that could contribute ore to the TGO processing plant. The results have been encouraging so far.

We've also commenced a ten-hole diamond drilling program at Peak Hill to test the sulphide ore below the Proprietary Pit – a site of earlier mining. To minimise noise from the drill rig, which is operating 24/7, we've built a sound wall of hay bales. This drill program is filling in data gaps in the ore resources. The previous drilling was completed in 1998.

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### **Dusty December**

As you know, TGO continuously monitors air quality to ensure our activities don't negatively impact the community. Unfortunately, we can't do much about the natural environment! During December, worsening drought conditions and dust storms blown in from western NSW caused our readings to spike.

Our monitors record particulate matter <10 micron, averaged over a 24-hour period. Anything over 50 micrograms per cubic metre in 24 hours exceeds the EPA's short-term criterion. In December, we recorded 10 instances of this (known as exceedances). On 31 December, a reading of 211.4 micrograms per cubic metre over 24 hours was recorded at our 'Woodlands' monitor in Tomingley. The picture below may indicate why!

### Community Fund

The Tomingley Gold Project Community fund continues to sponsor projects and organisations within the community. The recipients of the October round of funding were the Li'l Tackers Playgroup in Tomingley village and the Narromine Show Society.

Li'l Tackers Playgroup Tomingley Currently located in the old Tomingley School building, the Li'l Tackers Playgroup services farms and villages in the vicinity of Tomingley. Funding of \$3590 was granted to support the creation of a 'Baby Safe Zone'. This provides a separate safe space for the littlest kids to play, out of range of the older children.



### **REMO Report to Central West LEMCs – February 2019**

### 1) Operational Information

#### **State Heatwave Plan**

The State Heatwave Plan has now been de-activated. Arrangements were active from 15 Jan 2019 to 29 Jan 2019. No significant emergency management activity was been logged or required within the CWEMR.

### **Storm Activity**

Recent storm activity has seen significant damage, in concentrated areas, across a number of locations throughout the region. Whilst all of this work has been dealt with effectively by the local SES Units, Local Government and associated units, there has been a disconnect with some information sharing.

Whilst we appreciate the combat agency responsibilities, recovery management enquiries and Disaster Relief Funding Arrangements (DRFA) (previously NDRRA) enquiries are generally handled by Local Government, in respect of roads and essential public assets, LEOCONs, who have carriage of the impact assessment process, REMOs and the REOCON. Many of these enquiries are generated by local MPs through parliament or directly to Government department heads.

It is requested that all agencies at a local level update the LEOCON and/or REMO where operations are likely to generate DRFA processes or there are significant property / infrastructure losses. If it is Serious, Unusual or Newsworthy, we would like to know. A simple email will suffice in most instances.

Naturally, where there is significant loss of life or large-scale

evacuations a phone call is better.

### VARROMINE LGA CONSEQUENCE MANAGEMENT GUIDE

### 1. GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This hazard/activity addressed by this guide has a risk rating of Moderate

Narromine LGA has multiple roads upon which animals are transported. Transport accidents involving animals within Narromine LGA require coordinated response to manage health and safety of rescuers and public, and maintain animal welfare.

Narromine LGA has experienced 4 transport accidents involving animals that require management in the last year.

### 2. CONTROL

• The Combat Agency for this hazard is the NSW Police Force

### 3. COMMAND / CO-ORDINATION

- Agencies command their own resources under the co-ordination of the NSW Police Force Officer in charge.
- Agencies representing Agriculture and Animal Services Functional Area (AASFA) provide support.
- Narromine Shire Council to provide support with traffic control and removal of dead animals.
- VRA, RFS and SES to provide support with traffic control and removal of dead animals.

### 4. TRIGGERS

5. STRATEGIES

These occurrences will trigger the activation of an EOC:

• Confirmation of a transport accident involving animals that requires coordination to manage health and safety of responders and public, and maintain animal welfare.

Strategy	Details
Maintain public safety	Ensure human safety including public egress and movement, traffic management and fire suppression etc.
Establish animal ownership	Establish and maintain contact with the 'person in charge of the animals". If unable, make contact with authorised officer under the prevention of cruelty to Animals Act 1979 (POCTA) to address animal welfare. All NSW Police are under POCTA Act.
Maintain animal welfare	Contain straying and assess impacted animals.
	Rescue animals where safe to do so.
	Identify injured animals and if necessary undertake humane destruction.
	Determine disposal options and safely dispose of animals.
Transport and management of remaining animals	Transport remaining animals if assessed as fit to transport.

Item	Responsibility	Actions/Details
Scene assessment and stabilisation	NSW Police Force, General Land Rescue, VRA	Secure / stabilise accident scene and determine need for AASFA assistance to manage health and safety of rescuers and public, and maintain animal welfare.
Public safety and rescue	NSW Police Force, General Land Rescue, VRA	Narromine LGA Establish command post and exclusion zones. All personal to wear identifiable tabards
Fire suppression	RFS and Fire and Rescue NSW	Narromine LGA accredited services to provide fire suppression and protection with duties as directed
Establish and maintain contact "persons in charge" of animals	NSW Police Force	'Person in charge of the animals' is to be notified and give consent to treat or destroy animals, and transport fit animals to another location.  When the 'person in charge of the animals' cannot be notified, inspectors, veterinarians, competent persons and authorised officer ensure animal welfare.
Traffic Management	NSW Police Force Roads & Maritime Services(RMS) Narromine Shire Council	Narromine LGA Narromine Shire Council and RMS have responsibility of traffic management under the guidance of NSW Police Force.
Animal assessment	AASFA	Source veterinarian or authorised inspector to assess animal condition and determine need for destruction / ability to transport. For accidents involving animals that are not livestock, alternate veterinarian (other than LLS) should be sourced, i.e. horses.
Contain animals	AASFA Narromine Shire Council	Straying animals must be mustered to prevent injury, loss and traffic accidents. Animals can be temporarily held on roadsides, private land with permission of the owner (as there maybe biosecurity issues), and travelling stock routes with the permission of Local Land Services.
Treat animals	AASFA	Source veterinarian or competent persons to assess animal condition and determine need for treatment on scene or transportation to alternate location for assistance in accordance with animal welfare.
Large Animal Rescue	SES, VRA, RSPCA	Narromine LGA to utilise services of VRA, SES, RSPCA or a vet.
Destruction	AASFA NSW Police Force	Destruction of animals can be conducted without consent of 'person in charge of the animals' by competent persons (from NSW Police, RSPCA NSW, Animal Welfare League) and veterinarians where it is cruel to keep the animal alive in accordance with POCTA. Destruction of animals on animal welfare grounds can be conducted by an inspector, veterinarian and competent person when consent is available from the 'person in charge of the animals'.
Carcass collection	AASFA Narromine Shire Council	Carcass collection and removal procedures, personnel and resources required will be affected by size, number and jurisdiction. Local council can provide advice, resources and access to disposal sites. Private contractors can be used as resources to collect and transport animal carcasses.
Disposal	AASFA ESFAC (NSW EPA) Narromine Shire Council	Animal owners and managers have a legal responsibility to ensure that disposal of carcasses does not adversely affect the environment. NSW EPA has guidelines to minimise environmental contamination and should also be consulted for advice when considering options for disposal. Local council can also provide advice on how environmental impacts can be managed when considering options for carcass disposal. Narromine Shire Council has facilities for this.
Transport	Animal Owner NSW Police Force	Transport and management of remaining animals is responsibility of animal owner. Stock must be assessed as fit to transport. When in doubt, a veterinarian must be consulted and then only transport under veterinary advice.
